Supreme Directorum Report

As the last day of this fraternal year draws near, there is the traditional look back: a look at what was expected and what was.

For me, that look needs to go way beyond just the beginning of this fraternal year. That look must start 29 years ago in Philadelphia, with me as a college freshman. Presented with bids from two fraternities, one from AZO (expected) and one from KY (unexpected), I felt unsure which direction to take. I remember being in chemistry lecture and opening my spiral notebook to a fresh page. I drew a line lengthwise down the center of the page and wrote AZO as the left header and KY as the right. I proceeded to list each of the positive things I knew about the fraternity or the brothers from each fraternity. The KY list, though off to a good start, quickly slowed. The AZO list kept going on and on. In a way, I'm still working with the same list. Many of the people listed in chemistry lecture that day I still count among my friends. I hope that this year lengthened the list of what would be considered AZO's accomplishments.

This year saw the re-activation of Psi Chapter at Nova University in Palm Beach. This was an activation that came unexpectedly at the beginning of the year. Fr. Race Land and the fraters there are to be congratulated. They have been having regular meetings and are getting to know each other. Prior to their joining AZO, they had all just been acquaintances at the college. I was pleased about the auspicious start to the fraternal year.

Unfortunately, the other two chapters that we hoped to have started did not materialize. The University of Findlay is a newly organized pharmacy school. We were expecting for them to have their organizational open house in the fall semester. This open house did not occur until mid-March and the interest in fraternities was not what was expected. The University of Albany students (whom many of you met in Montréal) went through wonderful year of community service and school activity in their attempts to gain recognition by the Inter-Fraternity Counsel. However, their energy went unrewarded: the IFC decided to deny them admission to the college as a fraternity. They are able to reapply next year for re-consideration. This re-application is uncertain at this time.

One of my goals was to have the fraternity history updated with the writing of the 'Next 20 Years'. As of this writing, this task is still proceeding. Frater Strell is still compiling the information and lists necessary to the task. He is still polling the Supreme Directorums of each year for information. He is still authoring the prose. Frater Strell expects the completion of the manuscript about the Boston Convention. Please join

me in thanking Bruce for all of his work. I look forward to reading the outcome of his labor.

Another goal was to increase the use and abilities of the website. Fr. Mort Smith proved himself open to new challenges by augmenting the website in several ways. Most conspicuously with some minor changes in the look of the pages. More importantly with the new abilities for the chapters to submit excheque and signare reports on-line. Additionally, the appropriate supreme officers are able to directly access mailing lists.

During the fraternal year, I made visits to several chapters. My first visit was to Epsilon for their fall rush. I visited Palm Beach for the re-activation of Psi Chapter. This event included many of the PSD's that reside in the area who assisted with the ritual. Most significantly, Frs. Bruce Strell and Matt Gimbar, who were the primary orchestrators of the reactivation, were present. I had the opportunity to re-visit South Florida again in March with a visit to Miami Alumni. Miami had a fantastic brunch at the Hard Rock Casino in Fort Lauderdale. I was able to meet many of the Miami fraters and had the opportunity to award six 50-year pins to Miami fraters. As of this writing, I have a visit planned to Baltimore for a dinner with the Kappa Chapter. I am sure that more visiting opportunities will arise in the coming days.

I wish to thank the entire slate of officers, elected and appointed, for the incredible support this past year. The minutes were completed on time, the excheque reports were complete and accurate, the newsletters were of the appropriate number and spaced well, and all of the myriad of other things that the fraternity needs to run well were done. I appreciate all of the work that my fellow fraters have put into this year.

Big thanks to my wife, Cheryl, and Nicholas and Isabella for their support this year. They have tolerated the many calls and nights on email.

I hope the fraternity, in years to come, agrees that this year saw positive additions to the AZO side of the page.





2006 Meritorious Award Recipient

The fraternity's oldest individual honor given for long and distinguished service



Jeffrey M. Levy M.D., RPh., Zeta Chapter

He was born Jeffrey Mark Levy (now known to all of us as Dr. Jeff) on August 3, 1950 in New York City to two adoring parents Irene and Nat Levy. Jeff grew up in a very middle class neighborhood in the Bronx, New York and attended all local New York City Public Schools. During his growing up years his passion were sports of all kinds; especially baseball, handball, and basketball. School and studying at that time were not his major interests. In fact, they were the farthest thing from his mind. Lives during those years in the Bronx were relatively uneventful. Kids hung out in their neighborhoods. Friends were made, friends moved and their biggest expectations during those years were to stay out of trouble and go to school. Then, at the ripe old age of eight years old life would change forever. Enter Lou Flacks to begin dating his sister, Gloria. Lou was already studying pharmacy at Fordham and somehow, possibly by a process of osmosis, pharmacy seeped into Jeff's blood forever. What's more there appeared to be no turning back. So, while most high school students in Jeff's class were not quite sure of where their careers were headed, Jeff knew in junior high school that he was going to be a Pharmacist. After he graduated high school in 1968 he applied to only one school Columbia University College of Pharmacy and was accepted to begin in September of 1968. In a shady back door deal while in his first year of Pharmacy School he was transferred from the employment of Lou Flacks at Lon Pharmacy in New York City to the high tech, high volume world of Zive Pharmacy in the Bronx where he worked and was mentored by none other than the master Gerry Zive. Under Gerry's watchful eye he was taught the business and practice of modern pharmacy. The next important phase of his life began in College was when he met his first wife Miriam. He was subsequently married in 1972 and upon completion of Pharmacy School they moved to Florida. They were blessed with two beautiful children, Lorin and Adam and proceeded to make their lives in sunny Florida. Jeff went into business and all was going well until the next challenge came along, Jeff decided to go to medical school. Life would never be the same again. The challenge of going to


medical school in the Caribbean with two young children and two dogs, packing up diapers and baby formula was a feat onto itself, none the less successfully completed. The next challenge was to begin a residency in Internal Medicine at 32 years of age. Not only did he complete this residency with honors but he was asked to stay for his final year as the Chief Medical Resident in the Department of Medicine. Ultimately Jeff began his medical career in Primary Care because of his love of people and direct interaction with people who are in need. He eventually was asked to assume the medical directorship at a primary care facility of Cornell Medical College/New York Presbyterian in the Bronx and oversaw the medical care of the eighteen thousand patients that visited that facility each year. In addition to this responsibility he has worked as the Medical Director of the Department of Medicine at New York Eye Surgery Center in the Bronx, New York for the past 15 years where he provides medical consultations and preoperative medical clearances for patients that are to undergo eye surgery. He serves on numerous committees at the institutions that he is affiliated with. His tireless efforts on behalf of his patients have brought him the respect and admiration of his colleagues and the thousands of people that he has cared for over the years. He has always been considered to be the people's doctor with the ability to always relate to his patients in a humanistic and understanding way. Over the years Jeff has been asked to lecture on behalf of many pharmaceutical companies and has traveled extensively on medical and pharmaceutical issues. Indeed, we here at AZO have been privileged to learn from Dr. Jeff's lectures and continuing education programs over the last ten years.

In 1995, joy was added to his life when he met and fell in love with Cari Lopez and her daughter Cristina. Eventually Cari gave birth to their wonderful son, Alex and recently in Dr. Jeff's unconventional style Cari and Jeff were married this past Valentine's Day. The final chapters have not yet been written as this is an ongoing work in progress. No doubt that adventure, comedy and laughs will prevail as time goes on. We will keep you all informed.



Critics

by David Leonard Dyen Ph.G., D.D.S. reprinted from the June 1930 AZOAN

Every path in life is beset with individuals who are always ready to point out ways and means for making our every day burdens lighter. To them the many troubles which bother the other travelers of this work-worn hemisphere are as the trickster's crystal—very clear and very simple. This type is generally classified as a critic. And the only thing wrong with this appellation is that our world is completely composed of critics. The man who goes to see a show becomes a critic as soon as he ventures an opinion concerning its merits and demerits. The patient becomes a critic as soon as he or she decides that he or she knows more than the physician, or actually agrees to obey shim. The woman who takes unto herself a husband has probably eliminated all her suitors by criticizing them to the nth degree, unless she has been reduced to that nerve-wracking state where she has had to take what was available, and in this case she immediately becomes one of the most observant critics available, insofar as that unfortunate male is concerned. Therefore to point out any particular person or group of persons as critics is foolish. 'Tis true that there are certain individuals who by continued study of certain industries, sports and amusements, have managed to convince those who are in a position to pay for such convictions, that they know more about those particular subjects than the average man. These men are to the remainder of the earth's population what the eminent physician, who has purchased a suite of offices in the center of the city and announced himself as a nerve, heart, ear, nose, eye, etc., specialist, is to that poor country physician who does nothing but treat influenza as a mild cold and appendicitis as a belly-ache requiring a severe cathartic.

And so we must inevitably arrive at the conclusion that the individual who criticizes is not necessarily a genius, not necessarily clever, not necessarily prophetic. If he has a convincing personality then his opinions will naturally be accepted as final unless another convincing personality opposes those views.

In our Fraternity we can subdivide its members into a number of classes. Just at present there are only two of these with which the present article is concerned. They are: Class 1, critics who are always working in the service of the Fraternity, and, Class 2, critics, who are always talking about the critics who are working in the service of the Fraternity.

By a careful analysis of these two classes the reader will immediately arrive at the conclusion that he belongs to one of these two classes, or he doesn't belong at all. A little more searching and he will probably determine that with very few exceptions Class 1 is composed of the officers and the workers whereas Class 2 is com-

posed of past officers who are living in the sunshine of past endeavors and non-workers, who have no intention of doing anything that might even slightly inconvenience them.

That old adage, "People who live in glass houses should not throw stones," seems to have eluded the latter class. They are those venerable persons who are always ready to offer opinions as to why certain matters are not brought to a successful termination, and always have remedies to offer. Should the duties be offered them so that their highfalutin' ideas may be easily carried out under their personal supervision, they immediately offer excuses that they are too busy.

Now all this is written for but one definite purpose. Remember what you have read, and see if you do not fall into one of those two classes. Determine whether or not you haven't been just

hanging around and shooting off your mouth. There are more ways of killing a cat than to hold up the victim of your criticism to public ridicule. If you are so interested in seeing an officer or committee chairman do his work efficiently, and feel you know just what the trouble is, just offer to assist him and try to tell him personally, and not in a know-it-all or condescending attitude, just how he may accomplish his purposes.

A. Z. O., despite recommendations in our Constitution, does not pay any salaries to its officers, and whatever expenses are incurred in the fulfillment of their duties they usually have to fight for after having laid their personal money out to pay for those expenses. Usually months go by before they are refunded.

With the exception of the small amount of glory which they receive when their name is mentioned in the report of the Supreme Directorum, their reward for hard work is negligible, and to have someone, who is not doing anything material to aid them in any way, hurl remarks of a belittling character is sometimes more than some men can stand. Of course, some veterans have been so inoculated that they are immune to such attacks and simply credit them as ridiculous and forget about them, but not all our officials are in that category.

Remember, when you are about to offer comments concerning the poor write-ups in the AZOAN and the lack of advertisements, the failure of the Supreme Signare and Excheque to continually plead and threaten in order to get some action, that you are doing nothing that is wordly wise. Rather ask yourself: "What have I done to prevent this state of affairs?" The answer to that question ought to stop the criticism or the remarks to be made are unworthy.
